Preparing Your Pets for the New Baby By Brandi Dixon

Maybe you are thinking of adding on to your existing family or you're already expecting a little, beautiful disruption to everything you previously thought was normal (a.k.a. a child). It's never too early to start preparing your furry friends, both feline and canine to make them as comfortable with your new life transition as possible. Everything from their surroundings, their space and their schedules will likely change; it's good to make those changes intentional and gradual. Here is a brief outline of some considerations to make and some situations to prepare for. I'm no expert, but our kitties and puppies all cohabitate well with their tiny, new, furless, squalling siblings so I like to think our methods were effective.





Training: This can apply to both our canine and feline friends. Do your pets have any behaviors that would be dangerous or just won't work in a household with small children? Do they jump on people? Are they reactive on walks? Are there areas of the house, like a new nursery, that you would prefer to be pet free? As soon as you know a baby is coming, that's the time to make sure you're changing these behaviors. You hopefully have at least 8 months to get everything worked out. Consult with a trainer if needed, start changing what spaces your pets are allowed in, make the changes you need now rather than later. Handling these things early will make your lives a little easier in those first few months when you're so tired you're rocking a stuffed animal to sleep after the baby is already snoozing.

Space Changes: Your space is about to accommodate another being but it's important to make sure your pets still feel at home. Babies turn into toddlers who take some time to learn that their fur siblings need space and may not appreciate their grabby hands or unsteady locomotion. Make sure your pets have spaces of their own, away from the perils of sticky fingers and earsplitting wails. This may be an extra baby gate to give a canine a space of their own, a new tower for a kitty to perch atop, or a kennel to give them a safe spot they can retreat to.

Routine Changes: Our pets thrive on routine. When do we go for a walk? When and what do we eat? How do we do all these things and how might they be different with a child? Any changes can be disruptive and the more you can foresee and change before you bring a baby home the easier your pets will be able to adjust to their new lifestyle. Will your daily walks with fluffy include a stroller now?

Start off by trying to walk them with an empty one (or put a cute stuffed animal in there if you're feeling whimsical). Will feeding times or locations need to change? Change them early, well before the baby comes. You may also want to change any scents you can as early as possible. Some babies require detergents for sensitive skin or you may want to change what fragrances or other cleaning chemicals you use in your home. All of those are big changes for our furry friends and making them earlier will make the transition easier for them.

Welcoming the newcomer: Your new baby is here! Hopefully your pets have learned all the manners they need, have a cozy spot for themselves, have learned to deal with their new routines and are excited to meet their new, furless sibling. There are still a few small things you can do to ease the introduction. Setting a soiled diaper and a blanket your new baby has used and allow your pets to smell it. They'll get themselves acquainted with the scent of this new interloper you've brought home. When you're ready to introduce your baby, make sure they meet their fur siblings when they're calm(not wailing) and let the fur babies come to them. Don't try to force your pets to be near or touch the new baby, let them approach on their own. It may take time before they're comfortable approaching and that's okay.

Hopefully these ideas were helpful and made you think of ways to prepare your own pets for their new lifestyle. Now you can enjoy your new baby and your beloved pets! Inevitably there will be new routines and more changes to accommodate. For now you've prepared for what you're able and it's time to huff that new baby smell, get as many cuddles as you can manage, and nap while you can because you're going to be up in the middle of the night soon enough.



Planning for Your Pet's Care After Your Death By Leisa Gebetsberger

Fluffy is Grandma's treasured and beloved pet but then outlives Grandma. What happens to Fluffy? While you may have been dutiful to create a Will or a Trust for what happens to your money and belongings once you die, have you made plans for your pet if your pet outlives you? Owning a pet brings immeasurable joy and love into our lives but pets are completely dependent upon us for their care. If you become unable to care for them, you can make plans in advance for their ongoing care so they will be spared from being taken to a shelter.

One option is to have an attorney include a provision in your Will or Trust to ensure your pet has the kind of ongoing care and attention you provided during their lifetime upon your death. It is a way for you to provide resources for the benefit of your pet and gives you the opportunity to direct and provide for their continued care and support. You can designate a caregiver in the Will or Trust for your pet with a lump sum awarded to them for your pet's ongoing care.


Another option is to have a Pet Trust, now recognized in all 50 states. Just as you can create a trust for your family or a favorite charity upon your death, you can create a pet trust to provide ongoing care for your pets upon your death. Pet trusts are a legally enforceable way to ensure your wishes are carried out for the benefit of your pet. The trust can be as specific as you like. For instance, you can specify that your pet likes only a certain kind of food, or you want to be sure they see the veterinarian a certain number of times each year.

The caregiver you select should be someone you know who will be responsible for taking good care of your pet and ensuring all their needs are met according to your specifications. It is also advisable to name a successor caregiver in case the first one you name is unwilling or unable to assume the duties of being a caregiver for your pet. Be sure to identify your pet, with a specific physical description, a microchip or DNA sample, or you can simply say "any pets owned by me at my death."

You can fund your pet's care in the Will or Trust by identifying which assets are to be distributed for your pet's care, e.g. a specific amount of cash, an investment or life insurance proceeds. You should calculate how much funding will be needed to cover the expense of your pet's standard of living and care. You will also want to provide instructions for the final disposition (burial or cremation) of your pet upon their death.

This is a convenient and easy way to ensure your pets will receive the same level of care and lifestyle they are accustomed to receiving from you. The unconditional love of our treasured pets vastly improves the quality of our lives so let's all make sure we have a plan in place to ensure their ongoing care for when we are unable to provide that care ourselves!


