Why Do We Foster?

The dictionary defines the word foster as: being, relating to, or involved in a situation in which temporary care is given to an animal (such as one that is injured or awaiting adoption) in a household or similar setting.

Being a foster is like taking a complete stranger, having no knowledge of their past or personality and letting them into your personal space. If you're open to doing that then you are helping animals that might otherwise be euthanized, get out of an overcrowded shelter and most importantly, help a rescue save more animals.

As long time fosters, we have witnessed shy, scared, and sick dogs become happy and social under our care. It's been therapeutic for us by providing love to a dog and often receiving love in return. We once had a dog who had never known the comfort of a dog bed. She would sleep sitting up and on the hard floor. Little by little, with our help, she would lay on the comfortable dog bed and fall asleep. Pretty soon she was laying on her back, belly exposed, and snoring! By the time she was adopted she was a joyful and happy girl. It's very rewarding to watch a frightened dog blossom into a happy and confident dog which makes them more adoptable.

We've had dogs come to us with mange, who were skin and bones, heartworm positive and we were part of their recovery. Being a foster gives us the opportunity to get experience with training and animal care for future fosters. We have personal dogs and they help with our fosters by teaching potty training, how to share toys, and who gets what spot on the humans bed!

Being a foster teaches kids responsibility since they are part of the foster pack. I've watched my daughter at adoption events share stories about our fosters.

Animal Aid of Tulsa provides supplies, food and vet services. We provide the love and comfort and a home.

Another perk of being a foster is meeting like minded animal lovers and building friendships. Fostering is one of the most rewarding ways to help animals. Yes, there can be challenges, but the rewards like saving lives, gaining companionship, and knowing you made a difference far outweigh the difficulties.

An Adoption Story: Eva and Elijah

Two beautiful Anatolian Shepherds are finally living the life they deserve in a loving home. Their journey wasn't easy. They were found crossing a road when Eva was hit by a truck. Thankfully, a kind-hearted person stopped, rescued both dogs, and contacted us. Eva was rushed to the emergency clinic, where we learned she had a pneumothorax (collapsed lung) and infested with worms. Her brother Elijah (Eli) wasn't in great shape either. He also had worms and a torn ligament in his paw.



Both dogs received the medical care they needed, but with no immediate foster or adopter available, they had to be boarded. While they waited, we got to know them and they quickly captured our hearts. Despite their size and the trauma they had endured, they were gentle, affectionate, and incredibly sweet. They stayed in boarding for six long months. We visited them as often as we could, walked them, and took them to adoption events. We held out hope that they could be adopted together, but as time wore on, we prepared ourselves for the possibility that we might need to separate them just to get them out of boarding.

Finding one home for a 100-pound dog is hard enough. Finding one for two is nearly impossible. Then, in February, a miracle. We received an application for both Eva and Eli. We were cautiously hopeful. We brought them out to a beautiful country home with plenty of space to roam and introduced them to Pat and Mark. Not only were they unfazed by the dogs' size, they fell in love immediately. So did we. In that moment, we knew Eva and Elijah were finally home, together. Since then, they've been thriving. Their new parents even did a DNA test and it turns out they really are 100 percent purebred Anatolians. We couldn't be happier for these two gentle giants that finally got the happy ending they so deserved.





Kashmir came to us through T-Town TNR rescue. He was discovered hiding in someone's garage and refused to leave. It was clear he had been neglected and abused, with his ears cruelly cut off and his fur so matted that he required a complete shave. Kashmir still has a few trust issues, but he is doing so much better thanks to a loving foster home.









Veronica came to us from Jenks Animal Control with a severe case of mastitis that had abscessed, leaving a large wound in her mammary gland. The vets were not sure she would survive, but Veronica is a fighter and has made a full recovery. She is such a sweet girl, though she can be a little timid at first. We would love to find her a foster or forever home.
